MINUTES Regular Session Nacogdoches City Council

April 5, 2011 – 5:30 p.m. City Council Room – City Hall 202 E. Pilar Street

Regular Session:

Those Present: Mayor Van Horn; Council members Shelley Brophy, William Sanders, and David T. Norton; City Manager Jim Jeffers, City Attorney Rob Atherton and City Secretary Lila Fuller.

1. Call to Order.

Mayor Van Horn at 5:30 p.m. Council member Partin was not present. A quorum was established.

2. Invocation.

Mayor Van Horn gave the invocation.

- 3. Presentations and Recognitions:
 - A. Recognize Keith Kiplinger for being awarded the Texas Fire Chief's Association "Fire Chief of the Year".

Mayor Van Horn recognized Fire Chief Keith Kiplinger for the honor of being named the 2011 Texas Fire Chief of the Year by the Texas Fire Chiefs Association.

B. Present Proclamation designating April 10-16, 2011 as "Volunteer Week".

Mayor Van Horn presented a proclamation to Samantha Mora with the Nacogdoches Convention and Visitors Bureau designating April 10-16, 2011 as "Volunteer Week" in Nacogdoches.

4. Items to be removed from the Consent Agenda.

None.

- 5. <u>CONSENT AGENDA</u>: Items included under the Consent Agenda require little or no deliberation by the Commission. Approved as presented.

B. Consider approval of a grant application to the Texas Water Development Board on behalf of Region I Water Planning Group for Round 4 Regional Water Planning.

Approved as presented.

C. Consider approval of contract between the City of Nacogdoches and Alan Plummer Associates, Inc. on behalf of Region I Water Planning Group for consultant services.

Approved as submitted.

Council member Sanders moved to accept the Consent Agenda as presented. The motion was seconded by Council member Brophy and unanimously passed.

REGULAR AGENDA:

6. Authorize United Way to install signage and sidewalk stencils establishing a "Born Learning Trail" at the Hoya Soccer Complex near the intersection of Main Street and University Drive.

This item was pulled from the agenda.

7. Consider public/private partnership with Leadership Nacogdoches in providing bus shelters for the public transit system operated by Brazos Transit District.

Randy Coe, representing the Chamber's Leadership Nacogdoches Class of 2010-2011 appeared and explained the class had decided to raise funds for two (2) bus shelters as their class project. He stated they partnered with the East Texas Area Foundation and raised \$9,350 toward the purchase and installation of two (2) bus shelters and presented a check to Mayor Van Horn.

Council member Brophy moved to authorize the city manager to enter into an agreement with the Chamber of Commerce to provide two (2) bus shelters as described. The motion was seconded by Council member Norton and unanimously passed.

8. Consider an endorsement for the concept of a consolidated public safety communications center with Nacogdoches County.

Police Chief Jim Sevey appeared and stated that the concept of a consolidated public safety communications center had been in progress for many years. He stated the consolidation would increase the size of the Nacogdoches Police Department Communications Division so that the unit could receive calls for service at one answering point and dispatch services throughout the county from one single location. The effort, he explained, would unify and reduce the public safety answering points that were currently divided into three locations – the city, county and EMS – into one point. Chief Sevey explained the concept was being presented to receive the city council's support before moving forward with the project.

County Judge Joe English appeared and stated that this concept was one more example of the good working relationship between the city and county. He stated no cost estimates had been developed at this point, but the consolidation would provide a means to have an improved dispatch for the city and county, of which neither entity could afford individually. Judge English asked for endorsement of the concept, which would also be considered by the County Commissioner's Court on a future agenda.

Council member Brophy moved to endorse the concept of a consolidated public safety communications center as presented. The motion was seconded by Council member Sanders and unanimously passed.

9. Consider amendments to Chapter 102 "Traffic and Vehicles", Article X "Tow Truck and Vehicle Storage Business Regulations" of the City of Nacogdoches Code of Ordinances.

Police Chief Jim Sevey stated the amendments requested would bring the language of the ordinance in line with language used in the Texas Occupational Code and Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation. He further explained a drop fee had been added and all non-consent tows were set at the same price.

City council member Norton moved to adopt the Ordinance amending Chapter 102 regarding tow truck regulations as presented. The motion was seconded by Council member Brophy and unanimously passed. (Ordinance No. 1570-4-11)

10. Consider approval of a sole source purchase of a modular firearms training house by the Nacogdoches Police Department.

Police Chief Jim Sevey stated a grant had been received to purchase a modular firearms training house to be located on city property on Lone Star Road. He stated the purchase would be funded by the Department of Justice grant not to exceed \$306,405. He stated the purchase would be through a sole source vendor, Action Target.

Council member Norton moved to approve the purchase of a modular firearms training house by the Nacogdoches Police Department from Action Target, a sole source vendor, in an amount not to exceed \$306,405. The motion was seconded by Council member Sanders and unanimously passed.

11. Consider budget amendment and authorize approval for the purchase of two(2) Administration vehicles for the Nacogdoches Police Department.

Police Chief Sevey appeared requesting approval for the purchase of two administration vehicles through state contract. He explained that the vehicles would be funding from existing forfeiture money and would not come from General Fund. The vehicles would be purchased from Caldwell Country Chevrolet at a price of \$28,272 per vehicle, complete with emergency lights and sirens. A 5-year/100,000 mile power train warranty was also included in the price.

Council member Brophy moved to authorize a budget amendment in the amount of \$56,544 to purchase two (2) administration vehicles for the Police Department from forfeiture funds. The motion was seconded by Council member Norton and unanimously passed.

12. Authorize budget amendment for purchase of e-Civis grant search and management software.

City Manager Jeffers stated that grant funds were used to purchase equipment, repair sewer lines and to establish the recently formed spay/neuter clinic at the animal shelter. He explained that a tremendous amount of staff time was needed to research potential grants and there were limited methods to complete the task. Mr. Jeffers stated the e-Civis web-based software would allow staff to search by key work for government and private sector funding and would cut research time tremendously, allowing staff to spend time developing competitive grants. He stated staff was confident that the start-up amount would be recouped in one year from new grants received.

After some discussion, Council member Brophy moved to authorize a budget amendment to enter into a one-year contract with e-Civis for the grant search and management software, with funding to be transferred equally from General Fund, Utility Fund and Sanitation Fund reserves in the amount of \$12,850. The motion was seconded by Council member Sanders and unanimously passed.

13. Receive presentation on the City's Substandard Building Program.

Fire Chief Keith Kiplinger gave a brief presentation on the City's Substandard Building Program. He stated that 100 structures were identified in April 2010 after the city council adopted a revised building standards ordinance, with the following results to date:

- 10 structures were addressed by Historic Sites as they were in the Historic Overlay.
- 33 Structures were demolished or repaired by the property owner
- 18 structures currently have permits for repair or demolition
- 24 structures have had their cases heard by the Building Standards Commission and the status is pending (awaiting the time limits allowed by the Commission)
- 8 structures are currently ready for the City to perform demolitions
- 10 structures will receive hearings by the Commission in April and the remaining 5 in May.

The City Council commended Chief Kiplinger and his staff for their dedicated work on the program and encouraged them to continue their efforts to clean up the City.

- PROJECT: PUBLIC HEARING: <u>Consider the request for a specific use permit to operate an</u> <u>assembly/light manufacturing operation in a B-2, General Business District on Lots 15-A-3 &</u> <u>16-3, City Block 66, located at 330 NW Stallings Drive. This request has been made by Mast</u> <u>Motorsports. SUP2011-001</u>.
- MEETING DATE: April 11, 2011
- DESCRIPTION: Mast Motorsports, located at 330 NW Stallings Drive currently produces high performance engines by upgrading existing engines. The applicant wishes to expand their current facility to fabricate in house the parts utilized to upgrade the engines. This expansion meets the definition of assembly/light manufacturing, which is permitted in the current zoning district, with the approval of a specific use permit.
- COST: N/A
- SCHEDULE: This request will be heard by the City Council on April 19th. If the City Council approves the request, it will become effective immediately.

Planning and Zoning Commission voted unanimously to recommend approval.

 Compatibility. The specific use will be compatible with and not injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity, nor significantly diminish or impair property values within the immediate vicinity;

The use is compatible with the other property in the vicinity. Other properties in the vicinity, and on the West Loop especially, while they are zoned B-2, General Business, are actually heavy commercial type uses.

- Orderly growth and development. The establishment of the specific use will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of surrounding vacant property;
 This proposal is a slight change to an existing use. The establishment of an assembly/light manufacturing use will not impede the normal development of the surrounding vacant property.
- Supporting facilities. Adequate utilities, access roads, drainage, and other necessary supporting facilities have been or will be provided.
 Adequate supporting facilities have been provided for this property.

- 4. Drives and parking. The design, location, and arrangement of all driveways and parking spaces provides for the safe and convenient movement of vehicular and pedestrian traffic without adversely affecting the general public or adjacent development. Any expansions of the building must go through the construction permitting process, including approval of site design items such as parking and driveway access.
- Nuisances. Adequate nuisance prevention measures have been or will be taken to prevent or control offensive odor, fumes, dust, noise and vibration.
 City ordinances regarding nuisance abatement will apply. This use is not expected to produce odor, fumes, dust, noise, or vibration.
- 6. Lighting. Any lighting to be provided will be directional so as not to disturb or adversely affect neighboring properties.


The City's lighting ordinance ensures no lighting will disturb neighboring properties.


- Landscaping. Sufficient landscaping and screening to ensure harmony and compatibility with adjacent property exists or will be provided.
 If/when new structures or expansion of an existing structure is built, the property must comply with the landscaping ordinance.
- 8. Comprehensive plan. The proposed use is in accordance with the comprehensive plan. The comprehensive plan recommends rural development for this area. Rural Development is defined in the Comprehensive Plan as "sparsely populated areas with limited development that are still distinct from more urbanized areas. This typically encompasses relatively large tracts of unsubdivided land used for agriculture, forestry, resource extraction, widely-scattered homesteads or business establishments, natural open space, or activities not requiring permanent structures or improvements. Also includes areas that are gradually transitioning into urban uses and development."

This property is representative of widely scattered business establishments, and has been subdivided out of a large tract of unsubdivided land in the last ten years. This portion of Stallings Drive is gradually transitioning into heavy commercial uses, similar to that of the other portions of the West Loop.


The concept

Features of the trail Stencils
