

#### PROJECT: <u>Consider budget amendment appropriating \$25,000 for an Energy Manager and</u> authorization for City Manager to enter contract for Energy Manager services.

- MEETING DATE: November 6, 2012
- DESCRIPTION: Reggie Hudson, recently retired from Nacogdoches I ndependent School District, served as the school district's energy manager for 17 years. Mr. Hudson was part of a four year training program with Energy Education I nc., a leader in Energy Conservation, where he became a trained Energy Manager.

Currently City expends almost \$3,000,000 per year for electrical services including \$675,000 per year for street lighting. Mr. Hudson will be responsible for monitoring electrical use, altering behavior and make recommendations on equipment purchases which would reduce electrical cost. In year one Mr. Hudson has predicted he would reduce electrical cost at least \$50,000. The agreement is for one year and may be terminated at any point with 30 days written notice.

### ENERGY MANAGEMENT AGREEMENT

This is an Agreement between REGGIE HUDSON, an individual, (referred to in this Agreement as the "Energy Manager") and the City of Nacogdoches, a Texas municipal corporation (referred to in this Agreement as the "City"), for providing energy management and related services. City and Energy Manager are collectively referred to in this Agreement as the "Parties."

#### RECITAL

The purpose of this Agreement is to state terms and conditions under which the Energy Manager will provide energy management and related services for the City.

In consideration of mutual promises contained in this Agreement, City and Energy Manager agree as follows:

#### **Services Provided**

1. (a) The Energy Manager will perform: all services necessary to establish and maintain an effective and efficient energy conservation program for the City. Those services include without limitation:

- (1) Training for City staff to build awareness and consensus regarding possible energy conservation opportunities and implementation of measures to accomplish such conservation.
- (2) Physical examination of all City facilities and processes to determine conservation opportunities and implement or train staff to implement measures to accomplish such conservation.
- (3) Record, study, and evaluate each City utility bill each month to identify conservation opportunities and monitor progress and continuation of conservation measures.
- (4) Assist in evaluation of energy purchasing opportunities and researching the energy efficiency of new equipment purchases.
- (5) Assist and advise on planning for future energy needs and conservation opportunities, including an annual utility budget for the City.
- (6) Provide quarterly reports to City Manager, or his/her designee, documenting the effectiveness of the energy management program.

(b) After initial start up of services in paragraph 1(a) above, the Energy Manager will also monitor and promote water conservation.

#### **Energy Manager's Time**

2. The Energy Manager will not be required to exclusively work for the City since the Energy Manager is an independent contractor providing similar services to other clients. The Energy Manager will promptly and continuously spend all the time needed to accomplish the services to be provided in a good and workmanlike fashion.

#### **Independent Contractor**

3. The Energy Manager will be provided an office with a computer, the Energy Manager is an independent contractor and not an employee of the City. The Energy Manager will provide his own transportation, office equipment and any proprietary software needed for his services.

#### **Access and Materials**

4. The City will provide the Energy Manager with all utility bills and other related information reasonably required to complete the services provided. Additionally, the Energy Manager will have after hours access to all City facilities subject to prior notification and permission to enter into facilities or portions of facilities deemed restricted such as portions of the Police Department.

#### Confidentiality

5. All statistical and financial data relating to the operations of the City that are confidential and clearly designated as such will be kept in the strictest confidence by the Energy Manager. However, this obligation does not apply to any data that have become publicly available or that are rightfully obtained from third parties.

#### **Energy Manager's Responsibility**

6. The Energy Manager will use due care in performing the services to the City.

#### Compensation

7. The City shall pay the Energy Manager compensation for the services performed by him at the rate of \$25,000.00 per year, payable in arrears in monthly installments of \$2,083.33 each. As an independent contractor the Energy Manager is not an employee of the City and is thus not entitled to any employee benefit, insurance, or other compensation.

#### **Term of Agreement**

8. The term of this Agreement shall begin on November 7, 2012, and shall continue in full force and effect from that date until November 7, 2013. This Agreement can be terminated by either Party with a thirty (30) days written notice to the other Party. This Agreement may be extended from year to year upon subsequent agreement of both Parties. If

terminated early by either Party, the Energy Manager is to be paid his monthly installment through the last day of his services, but no further installments.

#### **Attorney's Fees and Costs**

9. If any action at law or in equity is necessary to enforce or interpret the terms of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees, costs, and necessary disbursements in addition to any other relief to which such party may be entitled.

#### **Miscellaneous Provisions**

#### **Texas Law to Apply**

10. (a) This Agreement shall be construed under and in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas, and all obligations of the Parties created in this Agreement are performable in Nacogdoches County, Texas.

#### **Parties Bound**

(b) This Agreement shall be binding on and inure to the benefit of the Parties and their respective heirs, executors, administrators, legal representatives, successors, and assigns.

#### Legal Construction

(c) In case any one or more of the provisions contained in this Agreement shall for any reason be held to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable in any respect, that invalidity, illegality, or unenforceability shall not affect any other provision in this Agreement and this Agreement shall be construed as if the invalid, illegal, or unenforceable provision had never been contained in it.

(d) This Agreement is not assignable by either Party.

#### **Prior Agreements Superseded**

(e) This Agreement constitutes the sole and only agreement of the Parties and supersedes any prior understandings or written oral agreements between the Parties respecting the subject matter of this Agreement.

PROJECT: <u>Consider removal of the traffic signal located at the intersection of Hospital</u> Street and Fredonia Street, replacing it with a 4-way stop sign configuration.

- MEETING DATE: November 6, 2012
- DESCRIPTION: The existing traffic signal located at the intersection of Hospital Street and Fredonia Street needs significant repairs and upgrades. Staff has been exploring the need to keep this signal in service. For the past month, the signal has been set to flash 'red' in both directions in an effort to see if a simpler 4-way stop intersection would be viable. The City has not received any citizen complaints and this 4-way stop condition has not caused any traffic congestion or accidents. Replacing this signal with a 4-way stop configuration will save the immediate repair costs and will reduce our long term maintenance efforts.
- COST: \$0

#### BUDGET AMENDMENT REQUIRED ?: No

SCHEDULE: If approved, the signal will be removed and new stop signs installed within 30 days.

### RECOMMENDED

ACTION: Staff recommends the removal of this signal and the installation of four (4) new stop signs.
