MINUTES Regular Session Nacogdoches City Council March 19, 2013 – 5:30 p.m. City Council Room – City Hall 202 E. Pilar Street

Regular Session:

Those Present:

Mayor Roger Van Horn; Council members Shelley Brophy, Roy Boldon, Bob Dunn and David Norton; City Manager Jim Jeffers, City Attorney Rob Atherton and City Secretary Lila Fuller.

Call to Order.

Mayor Van Horn at 5:30 p.m. A quorum was established.

2. Invocation.

Council member Dunn gave the invocation.

3. Presentations and Recognitions.

Mr. Jesse Williams with the Texas State Fire Marshal's Office presented a plaque for the City's recent improved ISO Rating from a "4" to a "2".

4. Items to be removed from the Consent Agenda.

Council member Dunn requested that Item 5-B be pulled for discussion. Mary Uresti, airport manager stated a request for proposals for aviation fuel had been sent to Chevron, AvFuel and Eastern Aviation (Shell), with Eastern Aviation, the current fuel provider, being the only one to submit a proposal.

Council member Dunn asked why Texaco wasn't mailed a bid, to which Ms. Uresti stated she was not contacted by Texaco showing their interest in bidding.

City Manager Jeffers stated all bid proposals are advertised in the local paper and on the City's website, which met the bid requirements and City policy. The City Council was given the option to reject all bids and a bid proposal could be sent to Texaco as well.

Staff was encouraged in the future to send bids to a larger pool of vendors.

5. <u>CONSENT AGENDA</u>: Items included under the Consent Agenda require little or no deliberation by the Council. Approval of the Consent Agenda authorizes the City Manager or his designee to proceed with conclusion of each in accordance with staff recommendations as reflected in the minutes of this meeting.

A. Consider approval of minutes from regular session of March 5, 2013.

Approved as submitted.

B. Consider approving new five-year contract with Eastern Aviation Fuels, Inc. (Shell Aviation Branding) which would allow continued aviation fuel services to the A.L. Mangham, Jr. Regional Airport's City Fuel Fixed Base Operation (FBO).

Awarded to Eastern Aviation, Inc. (Shell) as recommended.

C. Consider ordinance canceling the Northeast Ward and At Large (Mayor) City Council races scheduled for May 11, 2013 and declaring the unopposed candidates elected.

Approved as presented. (Ordinance No. 1621-3-13)

D. Consider placement of a historical marker on the north façade of the Gladys Hampton Building.

Approved as presented designating City Hall as the location of Sam Houston's first home site in Texas.

E. Consider the closing of Main Street (SH 21) beginning at 5:00 p.m. on Friday, June 7, 2013 through 7:00 p.m. June 8, 2013 for the 24th Annual Texas Blueberry Festival. Event Organizers are also requesting Sunday, June 9, 2013 for a potential rain date.

Approved as submitted.

Council member Norton moved to accept the Consent Agenda as presented. The motion was seconded by Council member Boldon and passed by the following vote:

AYES: Mayor Van Horn, Council member Brophy, Boldon and Norton NOES: Council member Dunn

Council member Dunn moved to accept the consent agenda as presented. The motion was seconded by Council member Norton and unanimously passed.

REGULAR AGENDA:

6. Consider an Ordinance of the City of Nacogdoches, Texas, finding that adoption of extended hours for the sale and public consumption of alcoholic beverages is in the public interest; amending the City of Nacogdoches Code of Ordinances to allow such extended hours; providing penalties; providing a severability clause and providing an effective date. (Establishments serving alcohol may serve alcohol seven days a week until 2:00 a.m.)

Robert Means, representing Applebee's restaurant appeared and appealed to the city council to adopt an ordinance allowing extended hours for the sale and consumption of alcohol. He stated this action would increase chances for the selection of Nacogdoches by other restaurant chains and the ordinance could be changed in the future if the city council desired.

City Manager Jim Jeffers gave a brief presentation, giving the city council the options to adopt an ordinance extending hours for the sale and public consumption of alcoholic beverages; deny the ordinance, or table the item for further study. He explained the ordinance would allow any establishment to observe late hours, and restaurants cannot be restricted by specific use permit, nor be restricted to weekend only hours.

Jim Sevey, police chief, stated when asked about the impact of extended hours that any time you add alcohol to a mixture there would be negatives – but what those negatives would be was an unknown. He stated there no were no communities within 50 miles of Nacogdoches that had late hours, so it may bring people from outside the community into town.

The Mayor asked for those who wished to speak in favor of the proposed ordinance, to which there was no one desiring to speak.

Karen Montes – 292 Spring Creek Drive stated it set a poor precedent for a restaurant to come into a community and coerce to get what they want. She asked that the city council consider the safety and well-being of the citizens and oppose the ordinance.

David Alders, chair of NEDCO, stated NEDCO was pleased to work with Applebee's representatives, but recognized the decision the city had to make. He stated he did not

believe the city council's decision would hamper economic development in Nacogdoches and NEDCO would continue to work and support the city council.

After discussion, Council member Dunn moved to not adopt an ordinance to extend late hours. The motion was seconded by Council member Norton. On a call for the vote, the motion passed by the following:

AYES: Mayor Van Horn, Council members Boldon, Dunn and Norton NOES: Council member Brophy

Council member Dunn stated they were charged to safeguard the welfare of the citizens and all angles he looked at revealed no redeeming factors to extend hours.

Council member Boldon stated he did not see the time difference bringing in that much revenue.

Council member Brophy stated this action could deter other businesses, reputable chains that have set policies, from coming in. She stated if this request was brought to them by NEDCO or the Chamber of Commerce, it might have been more palatable. She stated change was not an enemy, and she saw more positives in this issue than negatives.

Council member Norton stated more citizens contacted him who were against extending hours than for and he stood behind that.

Mayor Van Horn stated citizens opinions to him were both in favor and against. He stated Nacogdoches has ample character and opportunities and what we are now is not what we would be 10 years from now. He felt it was unwise to base an economic development decision on alcohol, and that was why he was opposed to extending hours.

7. <u>PUBLIC HEARING</u>: Consider the request for a Zone change from B-2 General Business to R-1 Single Family Residential for Lots 1 & 2 of the Redbird Acres Subdivision and Lot 5D2 and 5C2, all of City Block 54 located on Cardinal Street. This request has been submitted by Marvin Fausett – ZON2013-01.

Larissa Philpot, city planner explained the property owners wished to rezone three lots on Cardinal Street from B-2 to R-1 in order to rebuild a residence that was demolished on the property. The property was originally zoned B-2 in 1970 when zoning was established, and the property owners did not realize it until applying for a building permit.

Mayor Van Horn opened the public hearing. No one appeared to speak. The public hearing was closed.

Council member Dunn moved to approve the request for a zone change from B-2 General Business to R-1 Single Family Residential for Lots 1 & 2 of the Redbird Acres Subdivision and Lot 5D2 and 5C2, all of City Block 54 located on Cardinal Street as requested by Marvin Fausett. The motion was seconded by Council member Norton and unanimously passed. (Ordinance No. 1624-3-13)

8. Consider a consulting agreement with Meyers and Associates in providing representation and advice in legislative and administration matters in development of legislative projects, initiatives and activities with the United States Congress.

City Manager Jeffers stated for many years SFA and the City of Nacogdoches used a Washington consultant to work with Congress on legislative matters. Jeffers stated Meyers and Associates would contract with the City and SFA to secure funding for programs at SFA, and assist the City in identifying grants, seeking funding for I-69, securing designation as an entitlement City, and assistance in opposing negative legislation. The contract would be \$66,000 per year plus out of pocket expenses, with SFA paying 60% of the costs. Jeffers estimated the city's part to be \$26,400 plus expenses, and stated it was a budgeted item.

Council member Brophy moved to approve a consulting agreement with Meyers and Associates as presented. The motion was seconded by Council member Boldon and unanimously passed.

9. Consider the award of bid for the SW Pump Station Improvements Project (TWDB DWSRF 61250).

Steve Bartlett, city engineer stated 8 bids were received for this project, and staff recommended the low bid of Duplichain Contractors in the amount of \$2,319,166.22. He stated the project included major pump piping and electrical control upgrades for the SW Pump Station located on FM 225.

Council member Norton moved to award the bid for the SW Pump Station Improvements Project (TWDB DWSRF 61250) to Duplichain Contractors in the amount of \$2,319,166.22 a recommended. The motion was seconded by Council member Dunn and unanimously passed. (Acct. 62035 – Water & Wastewater Treatment Facilities).

10. Consider the award of bid for the Powers Street 500,000 gallon ground storage tank.

Steve Bartlett, city engineer, stated this was the last project under the SRF loan. He stated 10 bids were received for this project and staff was recommending the low bid of Duplichain Contractors in the amount of \$506,300. He stated the project included installation of a new 500,000 gallon ground storage tank located at the Power Street water plant site.

Council member Dunn moved to award the bid for the Powers Street 500,000 gallon ground storage tank to Duplichain Contractors in the amount of \$506,300 as recommended. The motion was seconded by Council member Brophy and unanimously passed. (Acct. 30.175.03 Tanks & Wells (funded from Utility Reserves as part of the Drought Groundwater Utilization Project)

11. Consider budget amendment to fund a portion of the portable restroom trailer facility.

Sarah O'Brien, main street manager stated for over 10 years the CVB and City had been planning to construction a permanent restroom facility in Festival Park for use at events. Due to Festival Park being located in a floodplain, construction of a permanent restroom facility would be cost prohibitive. The proposed portable restroom trailer would allow the city to use the facilities at events across the city, and to rent the trailer for use by other event organizers when not in use, with proceeds to go into a depreciation account for future maintenance.

Ms. O'Brien stated \$58,554.32 had already been raised, with the remaining amount of \$47,045.68 being split between the City of Nacogdoches and the Nacogdoches Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Council member Brophy moved to authorize the purchase of a portable restroom trailer as presented, with the city paying \$23,522.84 toward the purchase cost and authorizing the storage, delivery and cleaning of the trailer after use by the City. The motion was seconded by Council member Dunn and unanimously passed.

12. Adjourn.

SUBJECT however to the following covenant, condition and restriction:

- (a) The above-described realty, or any part thereof, shall not be used in the operation of, or in conjunction with, any school or other institution of learning, study or instruction which discriminates against any person because of his race, color or national origin, regardless of whether such discrimination be effected by design or otherwise.
- (b) The above described realty, or any part thereof, shall not be used in the operation of, or in conjunction with, any school or other institution of learning, study or instruction which creates,

maintains, reinforces, renews, or encourages, or which tends to create, maintain, reinforce, renew or encourage a dual school system.

These restrictions and conditions shall be binding upon Grantees, **John and Sharon Conner**, or his successors and assigns for a period of fifty (50) years from the date hereof; and in case of a violation of either or both of the above restrictions, the estate herein granted shall, without entry or suit, immediately revert to and vest in Nacogdoches Independent School District hereinafter referred to as Grantor, and its successors, this instrument shall be null and void, and Grantor and its successors shall be entitled to immediate possession of such premises and the improvements thereon; and no act or omission upon the part of grantor herein and its successors shall be a waiver of the operation or enforcement of such condition.

The foregoing restrictions and the other covenants hereafter set out are covenants running with the land, and each and every parcel thereof, and shall be fully binding upon any person firm partnership, corporation, trust, church, club, governmental body, or other organization or entity whatever (whether private or governmental in nature), without limitation hereinafter acquiring any estate, title, interest or property in said land, whether by descent, devise, purchase or otherwise; and no act or omission upon the part of grantor herein, its successors and assigns, shall be a waiver of the operation or enforcement of such restriction; but neither restriction shall be construed to be a condition subsequent or special limitation on the estate thereby conveyed.

It is further covenanted, that third party beneficiaries of the restrictions set forth above shall be as follows:

1) As to the restrictions set out in (a) above, any person prejudiced by its violation;

2) As to the restriction set out in (b) above, any public school district or any person prejudiced by its violation; and

3) As to either or both of the restrictions set out in (a) and (b) above, the United States of America, as plaintiff, and the America G.I. Forum, the League of the United Latin American Citizens (LULAC), and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), as intervenors, in the U.S. v. Texas, Civil Action No. 5281, Tyler Division, U.S. District Court, Eastern District of Texas; reported in U.S. v. Texas, 321 F. Supp. 1043 (E.D. Tex. 1970); U.S. v. Texas, 330 F. Supp. 235 (E.D. Tex 1971); aff'd with modifications sub. Nom, U.S. v. State of Texas and J. W. Edgar, et al., 447 F2d 441 (5 Cir. 1971); stay den. Sub. Nom. Edgar v. U.S., 404 U.S. 1206 (1971); cert den. 404 U.S. 1016 (1972).

It is further covenanted that in case of violation of any of the above restrictions, any of the third party beneficiaries above alluded to is authorized and empowered to prosecute proceedings at law or in equity against any person, firm, partnership, corporation, trust, church, club, governmental body or other organization or entity whatever (whether private or governmental in nature), without limitation:

- A) To enforce either or both of such restrictions relating to the use of the above-described realty;
- B) To abate or prevent violations of either or both of such restrictions; and
- C) To recover damages for a breach of either or both such restrictions.

It is further covenanted, that if any third party beneficiary referred to above shall prosecute proceedings at law or in equity for the aforesaid purposes, such third party beneficiary may recover reasonable attorney's fees from the violator or violators of either or both of such restrictions, if the Court finds that the proceedings were necessary to bring about compliance therewith.

Taxes for the present year are to be paid by Grantee herein.

This deed is given expressly subject to any existing right of redemption remaining in the former owner of the property under the provisions of law and also subject to any recorded restrictive covenants running with the land, and valid easements of record as of the date of this sale, if such covenants or easements were recorded prior to January 1 of the year the tax lien(s) arose.

MEETING DATE: April 2, 2013

DESCRIPTION: The FHAST (Fair Housing Action Statement - Texas) adopted by the City Council in 2011 called for the Council to adopt several policies to further fair housing in Nacogdoches. One of these policies aims to combat NIMBYism. The text of the anti-NIMBYism plan is below.

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development defines NIMBYism (NIMBY stands for Not In My Back Yard) as "a mentality adopted by those who reject certain changes to their communities." The NIMBY mentality is dangerous to communities, as it represents a refusal to compromise, a refusal to recognize personal property rights, and/or consideration of alternatives all which can stifle growth and development.

Often, NIMBY is reflective of residents' fears of the "worst case scenario" effects of proposed development or falsehoods which are circulating amongst those who oppose the project.

It is the goal of the City of Nacogdoches to combat NIMBYism by providing residents with information and public forums to discuss changes in the City. The goal is new development will be met with cooperation and understanding rather than opposition and misinformation.

To combat NIMBYism, the City of Nacogdoches will:

- Develop and distribute clear and accurate information on the development through the press and social networking sites and responding to community concerns at public forums. .
- Encourage developers to construct well-designed buildings that completement surrounding neighborhoods.
- Inform developers of potential NIMBY attitudes during pre-development meetings with City staff. Staff will share previous experiences with issues which provoked NIMBYism in the community and encourage the developer to work within the adjoining neighborhoods to ensure the proposed project compliments the neighborhood and is an asset to the City.
- SCHEDULE: Upon adoption by the City Council, staff will publish the policy on the City's website

PROJECT: Receive presentation regarding housing issues.

- MEETING DATE: April 2, 2013
- DESCRIPTION: Nacogdoches, like all college towns, has struggled with providing rental housing for all its residents in a way that meets the lifestyle choices of each population group. Additionally, Nacogdoches' large cohort of college aged residents fuels a need for a high percentage of rental housing. As traditional single family neighborhoods age, the rate of owner occupied homes tends to decrease, converting to rental properties. This transformation inevitably causes rifts between the long time full-time residents and the new renters in the neighborhood. University towns have the additional issue of the large population of student renters who are living on their own for the first time, and might be naïve to the issues of renter's rights to safe housing, property maintenance, and zoning laws.

Several options exist to attempt to resolve these diverse issues related to housing. None of these options will resolve the issues entirely on their own. Likely, a combination of several options will provide the best results for our community.

Staff will present pieces of the housing issue at several Council meetings. The first presentation will cover demographics and housing statistics. The second presentation will provide options for Council to consider and provide direction to staff to pursue. Then, at a later meeting, the Council will be presented ordinances and programs to adopt. Additional public hearings at Planning and Zoning Commission meetings and town hall meetings will also be held.
