Regular Session:

Those Present:

Mayor Roger Van Horn; Council members Shelley Brophy, Roy Boldon, Mike Keller and David Norton; City Manager Jim Jeffers, City Attorney Rob Atherton and City Secretary Lila Fuller.

1. Call to Order.

Mayor Van Horn at 5:30 p.m. A quorum was established.

- 2. <u>PRESENTATIONS AND RECOGNITIONS</u>: Mayor Van Horn presented a Proclamation recognizing the SFA Men's Basketball team for their successful season.
- Items to be removed from Consent Agenda.

None.

- 4. <u>CONSENT AGENDA:</u> Items included under the Consent Agenda require little or no deliberation by the Council. Approval of the Consent Agenda authorizes the City Manager or his designee to proceed with conclusion of each in accordance with staff recommendations as reflected in the minutes of this meeting.
 - A. Consider approval of minutes from the regular session of March 17, 2015.

Approved as presented.

B. Consider proclaiming April "Fair Housing Month" pursuant to Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968, as amended, prohibiting discrimination in housing and declaring a national policy to provide, within constitutional limits, for fair housing in the United States.

Approved as presented.

Council member Boldon moved to approve the consent agenda as presented. The motion was seconded by Council member Brophy and unanimously passed.

REGULAR AGENDA:

5. <u>PUBLIC HEARING</u>: Consider the request for a zoning change from A, Agricultural to R-3, Two-Family Residential, for Lot 7-A, City Block 61 located at 3220 Old Tyler Road. This request was initiated by Johanna and Chris Blackmon. ZON2015-001.

Larissa Philpot, city planner, presented the request and explained there was currently a home on this property and the property owners wished to build another home on the property for a family member to reside in. In order to have two residences, the property must be subdivided. Ms. Philpot stated the Planning and Zoning Commission voted unanimously in favor of approving the request.

Mayor Van Horn opened the public hearing. There being no one present desiring to be heard, the public hearing was closed.

Council member Boldon moved to approve the request for a zone change from Agricultural to R-3 for Lot 7-A, City Block 61 located at 3220 Old Tyler Road as requested by Johanna and Chris Blackmon. The motion was seconded by Council member Keller and unanimously passed. (Ordinance No. 1696-4-15)

6. Consider co-sponsorship of the 2015 Freedom Fest.

Sarah O'Brien, main street manager, stated this year the Nacogdoches Jaycees would take the lead in the annual Freedom Fest celebration on July 4 and have asked the City to continue to co-sponsor the event by providing use of Festival Plaza, the city parking lots and use of water and electricity.

Bruce Mayberry, chair of the 2015 Freedom Fest appeared and stated this year's event promises to be bigger and better with more fireworks that previously used.

Council member Keller moved to approve co-sponsorship of the 2015 Freedom Fest with the Nacogdoches Jaycees. The motion was seconded by Council member Brophy and unanimously passed.

7. Receive FY 2015-2016 budget presentation.

City Manager Jim Jeffers gave a brief review of current operational revenue.

No action necessary.

8. Consider approval for purchase of Caterpillar D4K Dozer for the Landfill.

Cary Walker, public works manager, requested approval for purchase of a small dozer for the landfill to be purchased through Buy Board for \$138,245. He explained they were only quoted \$15,000 as trade-in on the current dozer, so they were planning on selling the current dozer by auction to get a \$5000-15,000 greater return.

Council member Norton moved to authorize the purchase of a Caterpillar D4K Dozer for the Landfill as presented. The motion was seconded by Council member Keller and unanimously passed.

9. Approve and accept a Developer Agreement with Hunter Perry for the reimbursement of a sanitary sewer line extension in the 2800 block of NW Stallings Drive.

Rob Atherton, city attorney, stated ordinance provides property owners the opportunity to participate in utility line extensions up to 500 feet from the main line for public use. Hunter Perry has proposed to extend a new 6" sewer line at the 2800 block of NW Stallings Drive to provide sewer service for an undeveloped tract. He is requesting a developer agreement that outlines the procedures and requirements for the utility extension work, which will bore under Loop 224, and quantifies the maximum reimbursement cost of \$50,000.

Council member Keller moved to approve and accept a developer agreement with Hunter Perry for the reimbursement of a sanitary sewer line extension in the 2800 Block of NW Stallings Drive at a maximum reimbursement of \$50,000. The motion as seconded by Council member Brophy and unanimously passed. (Acct. 30.179.03)

10. Consider and possibly act on a Partial Release of Easement clarifying a city sewer easement does not apply to 6.06 acres of real property on N. University Drive owned by NG Realty Holdings, LLC.

Steve Bartlett, city engineer, explained the city had a 1973 easement for a 12" sanitary sewer line which is a "blanket" over what was a large tract. The affected tract has long since been subdivided into smaller tracts, most of which are unaffected by the actual location of the sewer line. NG Realty Holdings, LLC, the owner of a 6.06 acre portion on North University Drive has requested the easement be abandoned for this tract to clean up the title to its land and the line is not located on any portion of the 6.06 acres tract. Abandonment of the easement as to the 6.06 acre tract will not adversely affect the line in its actual location.

Council member Brophy moved to authorize a partial abandonment of easement clarifying a city sewer easement does not apply to 6.06 acres of real property on N. University Drive owned by NG Realty Holdings, LLC as requested. The motion was seconded by Council member Keller and unanimously passed.

The City Council went into Executive Session at 6:03 p.m.

Approve resolution supporting an application for the TxDOT Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) to be used to construct sidewalks on North Street.

MEETING DATE: April 21, 2015

DESCRIPTION:

TxDOT's Transportation Alternatives Program provides funding for alternative transportation projects such as sidewalks. The program provides an 80/20 match of city funds, exclusive of engineering costs. Staff recommends applying for funds to construct a sidewalk on the east side of North Street, beginning at Austin Street. This project was selected based upon citizen requests, the existence of visible paths pedestrians are using where there are no sidewalks, the origins and destinations on the route, and the feasibility of the project. TAP funds may not be utilized for acquisition, therefore a project had to be selected that would not require the purchase of any additional right of way. Considerations were also given to topography and existing conditions that could greatly increase the budget for the project.

Sidewalks currently exist on North Street, from Austin Street south to Craven Street. If funded, this grant has the potential to build upon the existing sidewalk network and complete a walkable and bikeable path from North Stallings to south of the downtown area. The greatest leveraging of federal funds and thus benefit to the City is achieved by applying for funds to construct a sidewalk from Austin Street to North Stallings Drive, which is a length of 1.43 miles.

Staff prepared estimates for a sidewalk from Austin to North Stallings, with shorter, less expensive alternatives. Each option is for a sidewalk on the east side of North Street. The data below is cumulative. The "City funds required" listed below is the required cash match and cost associated with the engineering design.

RESOLUTION NO. 1174-4-15

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF NACOGDOCHES, TEXAS CERTIFYING FUNDING AND SUPPORT FOR THE 2014 TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES PROGRAM APPLICATION TO THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, AUTHORITIZING THE DIRECTOR OF MUNICIPAL SERVICES TO SUBMIT AN APPLICATION TO RECEIVE FUNDING TO CONSTRUCT SIDEWALKS THROUGH THE GRANT PROGRAM AND, IF THE GRANT IS APPROVED, TO EXECUTE THE GRANT AGREEMENT AND TAKE OTHER ACTIONS NECESSARY TO IMPLEMENT THE GRANT; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Nacogdoches has an opportunity to expand its sidewalk network through the Texas Department of Transportation's Transportation Alternatives Program; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Nacogdoches has concluded that the extension of sidewalks on North Street (Business 59) from East Austin Street to North Stallings Drive will improve pedestrian safety by providing a continuous pathway for non-vehicular access.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Nacogdoches finds the improvements:

- 1. Are consistent with the Comprehensive Plan's transportation goals of upgrading facilities to enhance mobility and safety and providing for non-vehicular circulation.
- 2. Would directly improve pedestrian access to the high density commercial district along North Street (Business 59).
- 3. Would provide network continuity by tying directly into the currently funded Texas Department of Transportation project to improve and add sidewalks to East Austin Street (FM 2609).
- 4. Will be located in census tracts which contain greater percentages of minorities and low income households compared to the state average and will improve non-motorized access for persons in these census tracts.
- 5. Will support the state's tourism by improving non-vehicular access between two of the city's and region's largest tourist attractions, the downtown area and Stephen F. Austin State University, and the restaurants, hotels, and retail stores on North Street (Business 59).

WHEREAS, THE City of Nacogdoches plans to submit a Transportation Alternative Project application for the North Street (Business 59) sidewalk project; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NACOGDOCHES, TEXAS, THAT:

SECTION I. The City of Nacogdoches City Council supports funding this project as described in the TAP 2015 Nomination Form (including the construction budget, the department's 15% administrative costs, and the required local match).

SECTION II. The City of Nacogdoches City Council is willing to commit to the project's development, implementation, construction, maintenance, management, and financing.


SECTION III. The City of Nacogdoches City Council is willing and able to enter into an agreement with the department by resolution or ordinance, should the project receive TAP funding.

SECTION IV. The City of Nacogdoches hereby specifically authorizes the Director of Municipal Services to act for the City of Nacogdoches in dealing with the Texas Department of Transportation for the purpose of participating in the 2014 Transportation Alternatives Program and to make application for financial assistance; and the Director of Municipal Services is hereby officially designated as the representative in this regard.

SECTION V. This Resolution shall become effective immediately upon its passage.

Greetings Sir,

You may have heard that the Senior Center received a grant for the construction of a much needed annex building. The building is an 1800 sq.ft. free standing building.

The building is to be constructed on county property, and will become county property when completed.

Over the past 5 years, the Senior Center has added many programs to enhance physical fitness and wellness. Exercise equipment, a walking trail, physical exercise classes and Tai Chi classes have been added, which has drastically increased our participation level. At present, the physical fitness class meets in one third of the dining room which has been temporarially partitioned off. This class has been split, and two sessions are conducted due to the facility being too small. Approximately 100 seniors participate in this class alone. The Tai Chi exercise class has approximately 120 participants and they have also been split and are currently utilizing the activity room.

The new building will house these classes, freeing up much need room in the dining area. Plans for the future include some remodeling of the existing building to expand the kitchen area and have a physician evaluation area.

It is worthy of note that all of these program additions have been made without cancelling any existing programs. Dominoes, computer skills, meals (both in house and home delivered) continue to grow.

On behalf of the board of directors of the Nacogdoches Senior Center, I am requesting that the City of Nacogdoches waive permit fees in connection with this project. Any assistance will be appreciated.

The Nacogdoches Senior Center and the senior population of Nacogdoches County is thankful to you, city staff, and the city council for your past and present support.



ORDINANCE AMENDING ARTICLE II, PUBLIC PLACES, SECTION 86-27. CAMPING OF CHAPTER 86, STREETS, SIDEWALKS AND OTHER PLACES

ORDINANCE NO. 1695-4-15

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE 1535-11-09 AND CHAPTER 86, "STREETS, SIDEWALKS AND OTHER PUBLIC PLACES", ARTICLE II., PUBLIC PLACES, SECTION 86-27, CAMPING, OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF NACOGDOCHES, TEXAS, TO CHANGE THE GRANTING OF APRROVAL FROM THE "CITY COUNCIL" TO THE "CITY MANAGER OR HIS/HER DESIGNEE."

WHEREAS,	Ordinance 1535-11-09, Code Section 86-27, Camping, prohibits overnight
	camping on any city-owned property, unless permitted by the city council;
	and

WHEREAS, requests for overnight camping on city-owned property are infrequent and need to be addressed in a more timely manner than presentation to the City Council; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the permitting of overnight camping on City Property should be an administrative process by the City Manager or his/her designee rather than presentation and approval by the City Council; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that is in the best interest of the citizens of Nacogdoches to revise the current approval process for overnight camping on City Property.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NACOGDOCHES:

1. **Findings.** That the facts and recitations contained in the preamble of this ordinance are hereby found and declared to be true and correct and are adopted and incorporated in the body of this Ordinance.

- **2.** Chapter 86, "Streets, Sidewalks and Other Public Places," Article II, Public Places, Section 86-27, Camping is hereby amended as follows:
 - **Section 86-27.** Camping No overnight camping is permitted on any city-owned property, unless permitted by the City Manger or his/her designee.
- **Severability**: If any word, article, phrase, paragraph, sentence, clause, or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, the invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable.
- 4. Savings/Repealing Clause. Ordinance Number 1535-11-09 shall remain in full force and effect, save and except as amended by this or any other ordinance. All provisions of any ordinance in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent they are in conflict; but such repeal shall not abate any pending prosecution for violation of the repealed ordinance, nor shall the repeal prevent a prosecution from being commenced for any violation if occurring prior to the repeal of the ordinance. Any remaining portion of conflicting ordinances shall remain in full force and effect.
- **5. Effective Date**: This Ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage and publication as may be required by governing law.
- **6. Proper Notice & Open Meeting**: It is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this Ordinance was passed was open to the public as required and that public notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting was given as required by the Open Meetings Act, Chapter 551 of the Texas Government Code.
- 7. Official Public Records: The City Secretary is hereby authorized and instructed to file a signed and sealed copy of this Ordinance in and among the records of the City of Nacogdoches.
